"Time for Change"

On the evening of Wednesday, January 11, 2023, about 40 people gathered at courthouse for the discussion of forms of government that are available to Petroleum County. Dan Clark, the director of MSU Government Center gave a thorough discussion on the legal requirements and opportunities of various ways a county can be organized. Clark responded to the various questions from the crowd about how the various options differ from how would Petroleum County currently operates under the County Manager form of government that was adopted by the county in 1942.

The townhall meeting was called by the Commissioners because they are facing another time when the county needs another new County Manager. The Commissioners started looking at changing away from the County Manager form of government and had been meeting with a committee of locals and Dan Clark to explore the issues.

The change as proposed by the commissioner shows that if Petroleum County were to move to a Charter/Commissioner form of government, not many things about the county operations would change. The primary ...

What do you like about our little community?

I like Winnett because it is a small community, even though it is the county seat of Petroleum County. Being small, most of the people care about and look out for each other.

RALPH T. CORBETT

Few details about yourself and your family?

I grew up and went to school in Cascade, Montana.

Education & other skills?

After graduation I joined the Navy for four years. I spent my enlistment aboard the USS Mount Katmai, an ammo cargo ship, making three trips off the coast of South Viet Nam. We transferred all types of ammo, from small arms ammunition to 16" shells for the battleship New Jersey, plus bombs and rockets for planes on aircraft carriers. One of the highlights of my service time was watching the New Jersey fire a broadside salvo of all nine 16" barrels at once. Another highlight was the chance to watch "Puff the Magic Dragon," a specially equipped AC-47, fire a burst from a Gatling-style gun, and watching the red streak start from the plane and go to the ground. One of every five rounds was a tracer.

When I got out of the service, I went to Montana State for three years. During the college era, I worked summers for the U. S. Forest Service, building trails into the Bob Marshall Wilderness area.



Time for Change Cont...

...difference would be that the three elected county commissioners would take over the load of the management of the county that are legally assigned to the County manager alone under the current form of government. They feel that the lengthy list of responsibilities has proven to be too much for any one person to handle effectively. They pointed out that it has always been difficult to find a qualified county manager candidate willing to work in Winnett at a salary the county can afford to offer.

The commissioners state that they feel the repetitious turnover of the County Manager position is costly to the county. Historically, it takes a couple years for a new manager to learn the various aspects of the job but then it overwhelms them, they burn out and resign. There is no legal flexibility allowing the commissioners to change the duties of the County Manager. By statute the county has to replace the manager, give them all the same load to learn and to handle and hope they will be able to succeed.

As shown in one of the handouts the statute that legally defines the duties of our County Manager are as follows: MCA 7-3-304. Duties of manager. The manager shall: (1) enforce laws, ordinances, and resolutions; (2) perform the duties required by law, ordinance, or resolution; (3) administer the affairs of the local government; (4) direct, supervise, and administer all departments, agencies, and offices of the local government unit except as otherwise provided by law or ordinance; (5) carry out policies established by the commission; (6) prepare the commission agenda; (7) recommend measures to the commission; (8) report to the commission on the affairs and financial condition of the local government; (9) execute bonds, notes, contracts, and written obligations of the commission, subject to the approval of the commission; (10) report to the commission as the commission may require; (11) attend commission meetings and may take part in the discussion but may not vote; (12) prepare and present the budget to the commission for its approval and execute the budget adopted by the commission; (13) appoint, suspend, and remove all employees of the local government except as otherwise provided by law or ordinance; (14) appoint members of temporary advisory committees established by the manager.

The commissioners spoke of concerns that the County Manager's defined duties are too far reaching and it is a concept that may have worked 80 years ago but is no longer appropriate. If the voters approve the change to a charter/commission form of government, it will take effect July 1, 2023. For the past couple years, the commissioners have been meeting twice a month because the agenda items were more than could be handled by only meeting once a month. The commissioners admit that they expect the change will likely take them a couple years to adjust to, to learn to directly cover all the various issues. That challenge will take more time and effort, but the commissioners feel it is the long term, better choice for the county. With three commissioners working through the various issues together with the staff, the county is at far less risk than leaving all these issues in the hands of one person, the county manager.

The attendees also reviewed the proposed Charter which would give Petroleum County self-governing powers which provide the broadest range of local power that are exercised by ordinance or resolution. The 1972 Montana Constitution provides that a local government with self-government powers may exercise any power not prohibited by the constitution, law, or charter (MCA 7-1-101). In 1996, Fergus County voted to adopt self-government powers, the commissioners were able to maintain a commission form of government through the adoption of a charter. Many Montana towns also operate under a Charter.

The commissioners plan to host another town hall meeting in February to give constituents another opportunity for a live discussion about the idea. The intention is to put this Change of Government issue on the ballot in June. If the change is approved the commissioners would assume their new role immediately. If the voters choose to have the county continue under the County Manager from of government, the commissioners will start the task of attempting to find, hire, and train another new county manager.

The commissioners encourage everyone to come to future meetings, go to the courthouse to get the handouts, and ask questions. They want to help everyone understand the choices and be informed. They will keep everyone informed of future Town Hall Meetings.



Based loosely on the board game of CLUE, humor is blended with intrigue as a variety of local actors and actresses occupy the new Petroleum County Community Center stage in its first production, Clueless in Catscratch.

The PCCC Players will present this original play in two performances. The evening show will be at 7:00 on Friday, February 10. Preceding the play, Partners in Education is preparing a dinner at the Community Center. Reservations are available by contacting any PIE member. Proceeds will go toward the PCCC theater's enhancement. The second performance will be a matinee on Sunday, February 12 at 1:00. Ticket prices are \$10 for adults and \$5 for children under 12. Tickets can be purchased at the door. The cast and Winnett community look forward to the long-anticipated debut of this play as well as the opportunity to perform on a stage, especially this one. Two "firsts" for the price of one.

Hello Fellow Winnett Times Newsletter Fans! We hope that you have enjoyed the last 19 editions of the W.T. newsletter, either in print or digitally, and that you feel it is a worthwhile project.

As a brief reminder of our history, the first edition came out in May of 2021. Several volunteer writers and helpers have been involved, but the layout and formatting has been done by Trish Smith to the tune of many hours, using her personal computer. The Winnett ACES non-profit group has been our fiscal sponsor and the Winnett school has provided newsletter content, along with a monthly dollar donation and the use of their bulk mailing permit. The Newsletter is mailed to over 250 postal patrons in the county along with about 90 outlying addresses. Remaining issues are left for pickup in local businesses, all provided by generous donations. This generosity has been amazing, but as printing costs continue to go up (costing approximately \$530 for 350 issues in 2021, to \$750 now), and with minimal volunteers, our "committee" has decided we need to do some restructuring. As always, there are pros and cons to all sides of the consideration; working through ACES allows a tax-deductible donation plus printing deductions; using the school bulk mailing permit allows for much lower mailing costs; the con to that is, it seems we are not allowed (or there are gray area questions anyway) to sell or solicit ads to help with our costs. We have talked about becoming our own entity and selling subscriptions and ads, but that increases the need for another volunteer to keep track of it all. We are also considering doing some fundraising/raffles at a future date to help subsidize the newsletter project.

Any feedback and suggestions are welcome!

Not wanting to completely abandon the printed version of the newsletter, we will apply for some grant funds to help with printing/postage costs and will plan to mail out a newsletter every other month starting in February 2023. The printed edition will continue in full color at this point with the option of going to a combination of color/black and white to help cut costs farther if needed. On the off months, Trish will continue with a scaled back digital version that will be individual updates & snippets posted on the Winnett Times Facebook page. If we are successful with grant requests for printing, we are proposing to pay layout editor, Trish Smith, a small stipend for some of her time. Because most grants do not fund salaries, this stipend would come from donated funds as long as they are available.

We are making every effort to keep the newsletter going without stressing the volunteers and donations that have been so generously given. Thank you for bearing with our "growing pains," thank you to all for your generosity in the past, and any future donations and writing help would be gratefully accepted.
