Kelsey Loper: Winnett's "Alone" Star Interview

Quick Bio:

Born in northern Wisconsin, Kelsey learned to hunt and fish in the Northwoods at an early age. At age 19, she moved to Wyoming to guide at a dude ranch and never looked back. The mountains hooked her and from there she learned archery and trapping. She made money by training horses in the summer, trapping bobcats in the winter, and working at a vet clinic in between.

Kelsey met Brady Burdick through a mutual friend in Montana, and they have been together for 8 years. In their spare time, you can often find them embarking on exciting adventures, from fishing in Costa Rica to bowhunting elk, deer, and antelope. Kelsey has faced numerous challenges, including nearly drowning, being charged by grizzly bears, and having the mountains test her strength. She firmly believes that no one should hold you back and that you should always embrace opportunities and adventures, regardless of the circumstances. After all, you can always earn money, but memories are irreplaceable.

Currently, Kelsey lives off the grid in Winnett, where she works as a relief licensed vet tech as needed. She guides elk hunters in the fall and trains wild BLM mustangs and burros in the summer. Additionally, she manages a 501(c)(3) nonprofit rescue, Long Acres Rescue, where she connects suitable adopters with the horses and burros she trains.

How did you have to apply, and why did you decide to apply?

A casting producer reached out to me on Instagram saying I seem like a great candidate for the show. It was March 2022, we talked and I was ready for the application process until they told me the covid vaccine was required. I said call me back when that requirement changes.

They called me back March 2023 and said there are no more covid restrictions, and they want me to apply. I needed to know how to make a Paiute deadfall, a figure 4 dead fall and shoot archery with a traditional bow. I have never made those traps, and I only shoot a Hoyt compound bow. They wanted me to thrive and be successful so we both decided to wait until the next season so I could prepare with more primitive skills.

About 6 months later they called again while I was guiding elk hunters in Montana. I still hadn't bought a recurve bow but said I'll get on it and apply. I needed to send in videos of everything from shelter making, setting traps, to water filtration and hunting. I had about 2 months to get in hours of video and learn some new skills. From there they take 100 people and pick 24 to go to boot camp. I was shocked when they called and said I made it to boot camp. Then after a 2 week bootcamp they chose the 10 participants, which I was one of them. So, they found me, and I said, "Heck yea let's go!"

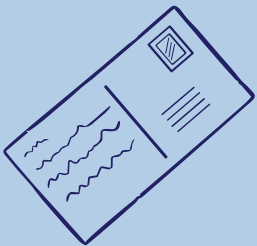


Winnett Post Office

A Little bit of History

The year was 1909 and the town of Winnett was just beginning to emerge. The first post office was located in the general store on a trial basis on the Walter Winnett Ranch near McDonald Creek. To qualify as an official United States post office, the need for a post office had to be proven and justified. The mail was delivered Tuesdays and Fridays from the Flatwillow Post Office to the Winnett Store for six months, with careful records kept of all the mail handled. At the end of the six-month period, the postal department extended the route serving Flatwillow to include Winnett. The Winnett Post Office was officially sanctioned on October 4, 1910, with John W. Hughes chosen as the first postmaster.

In 1914, the post office may have been moved to the Rasmussen store (records are unclear) until a new frame building was built in 1915 on Lot 3, Block 18 of the Winnett town site. The mail continued to come by stage until 1916, when a route was established between Grass Range and Winnett. In 1917, the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railroad was extended to Winnett. As a result, the railroad was awarded the contract for transporting mail. Local draymen were awarded contracts to transport mail to and from the Winnett depot and post office. When the train discontinued service to Winnett in 1956, the mail was delivered from Roundup and Jordan by motorized vehicles.



In 1921 the post office building was consumed by fire. During this period, all postal services were handled at Midget Grill until a new brick and tile building was constructed on the same site as the previous building. In July 1926 the post office was moved to the former Marti building. The old building still sits just east of the new 55 Main Building on Main Street.

In 1972, a new post office building was constructed across the street at 5 W. Main Street, where the current post office still operates. Mail arrives each morning around 7:00am from Billings via Roundup and is picked up each day at 3:00pm when it goes back to Billings via Roundup. There are 4 contract routes that operate out of the office. The east route delivers to customers and post offices Monday through Friday from Winnett

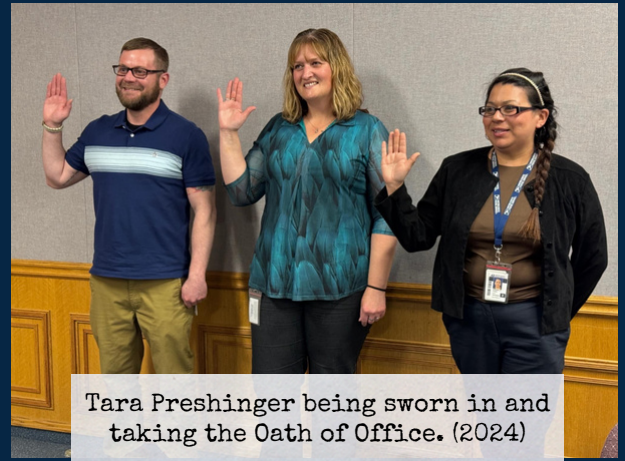
to Cat Creek, Mosby, Sand Springs, and Jordan where the route turns back to Winnett, delivering out of Jordan, Sand Springs, Mosby, and Petrolia Bench ending back in Winnett. The east route delivers on Saturday only between Winnett, Mosby, Sand Springs and Jordan offices. The north route delivers Tuesday and Friday to Welter Divide, Valentine, 79 Trail and Dovetail ending back in Winnett. The south route delivers to the Flatwillow area and ends back in Winnett. The Mosby route delivers from Winnett to Old Stage Road and back to Mosby.

Life brought me back to Winnett and my family as a single parent of a three-year-old daughter. At that time, job selection was slim. I worked at the Kozy Korner for Jim and Marge Johnson while also employed in construction to generate the best income possible. Construction took too much time away from my kiddo, so I decided to look for another solution. Luckily, the opportunity arose to drive a rural contract mail route from Winnett to Jordan. Prior to current contract holder Brad Olson, I drove this route part-time for George Stewart, who took over for John Phillips, preceded by his father and fellow route driver Eldon "Peewee" Phillips, also of Winnett. I then became a part-time alternate PMR (Postmaster Relief) to Marlene Grantier under Postmaster Luann Knutson. At the time, I was also working for Gary and Linda Gershmel at Gershmel's General Store, where I was employed for ten years. These positions allowed me versatility in raising my daughter.

From 2015 to 2023, I was the Petroleum County Deputy Treasurer, and I now hold the position of USPS Winnett Clerk since 2024. I am happy to be back with the postal system and working alongside Postmaster Tara Preshinger. And whenever you find yourself going "postal," drop in and say hi!

Apple Dump Cake



Ingredients

3/4 cup (1 1/2 sticks) salted butter, cut into slices, plus more for the baking dish

2 (21-oz.) cans apple pie filling

1 tsp. apple pie spice

1 (15.25-oz.) box yellow cake mix

Jarred caramel sauce, for serving (optional)

Vanilla ice cream or whipped cream, for serving (optional)

Directions

- Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Butter a 9x13" baking dish.
- Dump the apple pie filling into the prepared baking dish. Sprinkle with the apple pie spice. Sprinkle the cake mix over the top of the fruit. Distribute the butter slices evenly over the cake mix.
- Bake until the top is brown and bubbly, 50 minutes to 1 hour.
- Serve drizzled with caramel sauce and topped with ice cream.

ALONE- SEASON 12

Where was this filmed?

The location for season 12 is different than any other season of Alone because we went to a dry arid location compared to the frigid cold artic. We were in the Great Karoo Desert of South Africa. We launched May of 2024 as Africa was just going into winter. Day time temps were in the 80s and night was in the 30's, but the longer you stayed the colder it got, especially at night. I think the coldest night was around 20 degrees F. Season 1 the last person lasted 56 days, and another season they lasted 100. So there is no telling how long someone will last, especially in a new location where they have never filmed before.

You were able to bring ten things with you. What thought process did you use to decide on these ten things?

We are allowed to bring as many items to location as we want. We can take 15 or 20 items for our 2 week orientation on location. Then we choose 10 the day before we launch. We get to get a lay of the land and weather before choosing. I wanted things to help me get big game and fish and a ration of some sorts. I tried not to think about taking any comfort items. If it didn't have more than 1 purpose I probably didn't want it.



Does "Alone" mean you are really alone without a camera crew?

Yes alone means you are truly alone. We had camera classes, and we had orientation to learn all the gear we needed to film ourselves. We have 1 big main camera and 2 go pros, as well as a couple trail cameras. The camera crew films the helicopter ride that takes you to your individual spot then when you get off the helicopter they leave, and all the filming is on me. I have tripods and go pro attachments to get multiple angles and views. The camera crew only comes to check on you when the medics come to medical checks or if you tap out. Medical checks are every 3 weeks in the beginning and slowly get closer together as you lose more and more weight. They make sure you don't get in a danger zone of weight loss. They can pull you from the game at anytime if they feel you are not fit to continue health wise. Illness like giardia, constipation and injury can also cost you the game.



What was the most difficult thing about being "alone?" Or did you not find it difficult?

I find this show to be more mental than physical. Your mind will tap out before your body usually. It was very hard. If anyone says it's easy they are lying. It was hard not bouncing ideas off anyone, it was hard not to think of home, it was hard when I had multiple family members have birthdays while I was out there and not talk to them, it was hard to keep encouraging myself to continue on days I wanted to quit, it was hard with no food, it was hard when things didn't go right and had no creature comforts. I had a blast and stayed positive, but it took work.



What were your emotions going into being "alone?"

My emotions were pure excitement, like a kid going in the woods to build a fort but not needing to be called in for bedtime. I literally had no obligations and could do anything I wanted, it was freeing to know I just need to find food and shelter but could do whatever I wanted when I wanted.



What did you think about while you were "alone?"

I hiked a lot and was constantly trying to find big game to harvest and eat. I did not think about Brady or home because it made me emotional so I kept busy with scouting and lots of sun naps. The things I missed most were my books because I read 24/7 and my watch because I love to time everything and it's a habit to look at my watch every now and then. It was hard not to read my book before bed or watch a movie to "wind down" after a long day. It really was great to get away from the everyday creature comforts.

How do you let production know if you want to be done with the show?

You can tap out a few different ways. You have an emergency red button on your yellow brick which is a GPS device. If you break a leg hiking, slice your hand, etc. This is what you push. If your not in any danger you use a satellite phone to tap out and they will come get you. If that dies or doesn't have great connection there is a last and final source of communication and that is a radio.

If you could give one piece of advice to young people, what would it be?

My advice would be that there is a whole other world of adventure out there and not to be afraid to jump and go on crazy adventures. You can always make money, you can't always make memories. If you are questioning doing something, always do it. Because if you succeed you are one step closer to your goals, and if you don't it will shape you into the strongest person you know and make you smarter and more resilient.



Kelsey was the runner up in Season 12 of "Alone" - placing second out of ten contestants, and the first female contestant to shoot a big game animal. She lost 27 pounds and remarkably went 12 days without eating during her final days on the show. Kelsey's strategic approach and adaptability helped her endure the harsh desert conditions for over 30 days!
