“Winnett Volunteer Fire Department” *By Raye Anne Lund*

The establishment of the Winnett Fire Department began in 1922. The earliest records I could find show a preamble, constitution, and by laws were drawn up and approved in April of 1922. Frank Nelson was acting chief, and Oscar Nelson was the secretary. January 1923, Frank J. Nelson was elected chief, Joe Neil assistant chief, and A.J. Saylor secretary/treasurer. One of the earliest meetings in May of 1923 was a special meeting to discuss the purchase of electricity. Active firemen at that time were Frank Nelson, Joe Neil, A.J. Saylor, Arthur Nelson, Frank Dormell, John Feaster, Geo Olds, and the Winnett Telephone Exchange. Two familiar names I came across - Clifford Cook, and Jim McCue – volunteered on the department in the late 1950's and early 1960's. In doing my research, I was able to compile a list of the chiefs from 1923 to the present. Frank J. Nelson 1923-1930, Otto Moore 1930-1943, L.M. Black 1943-1944, Joe Pittman 1944-1949, Fred Story 1949-1952, Elmer Grosser 1952-1975, Ron Olson 1975-1999, Leonard Eickhoff 1999-2015, Bill Cassell 2015-2017, Tye Lund 2017 to present (2021).

Over the years, there were a number of men who volunteered for the fire department. These men were ranchers, farmers, businessmen, business owners, neighbors & friends. Bob Storer, Hugh Grover, Bob Coffee,

Rudy Glatz, Ernest Freburg, Henry Lengemann, Eldon Phillips, Tom Wangseng, Hugh Brindley, Bill Kindt, Carl Brindley, Harold Belstad, Jack Bariscich, Fred Kastner, Ron Kastner, Ron Heitz, Jim Davis, Doyce Woodiwiss, Buster Barbee, John Lea, Gary Allen, Ken Kipf, Chuck Allen, Chuck Knutson, Ron Olson, Joe O'Meara, and Allen Simms are some of the names that I found. They are all familiar to names to most of us. I am sure there were a lot of others but these names I was able to find in the old minutes. Ron Olson passed away in 1999 after serving as chief for 24 years. He enjoyed being chief and worked hard to have a good crew for the fire department. Leonard Eickhoff took over as chief when Ron passed and finished out 1999, then was elected chief in January 2000. He was chief until 2015 when he chose to retire as chief but still remained an active firefighter.

A lot has changed since 1922. Women can now be on the fire department and there are more rules and regulations by which the entire fire department has to abide. Anyone who wants to be on the fire department is required to go through a basic training course before they are allowed to drive one of the fire trucks. All of them also do refresher courses to find out new regulations, how to use new equipment and learn any new safety measures. It is sort of like continuing education credits. If anyone wants to

fight fire for the state, there is a pack test and other courses to take to get your red card. Then if the state is needing additional fire fighters anywhere and request additional resources, you can assist however needed. In addition to more regulations from insurance companies, the BLM is strict about who fights fire on their lands. They usually request help from fire departments or certified firefighters. Most private landowners are so thankful when the fire department shows up. They are willing to drive tractors to build fire lines and cut fences if needed to get to the fire the best feasible way. Neighbors and passing motorists have been known to show up in pickups with water tanks, shovels, bottles of water, and anything else they can find to help fight the fire.

The fire department does more than just jump in a truck and head to a fire. They are also called out for vehicle accidents. Their trucks are available if a fire starts in the road ditch, they check to make sure gas or hazardous material aren't leaking and they have helped with traffic control. If a patient is trapped inside, the department has extrication equipment to get them out, and they can help with lifting or carrying an injured passenger to the ambulance.

Kindergarten - by Oakley Lund

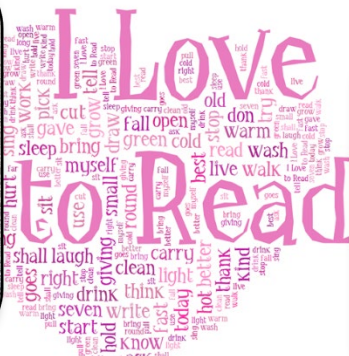
Happy New Year from the kindergartners!

1st & 2nd Grade by Mason Torgerson

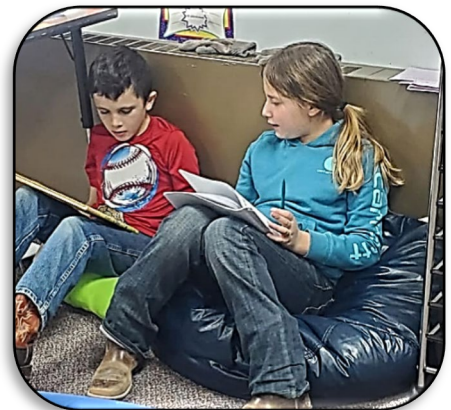

RASPBERRY XOXO CHICKEN

Class of 2016

6 Chicken Breasts
1 T olive Oil
½ c Chopped Onion
¼ c Raspberry Jam

½ c Frozen Raspberries (Keep a few as garnish)
½ tsp Black Pepper

Make-ahead instructions: In a one gallon reusable bag or glass dish, add all the ingredients together and store. If you have time, marinate the meat in the sauce for 30 minutes or more. Cooking directions: Preheat oven to 375°F. Remove chicken from marinade (reserve marinade) and place on sprayed baking sheet Bake for 15-20 minutes until browned (internal temp. 165°F). If you choose to use bone-in and skin-on breasts, cook for 45 minutes, skin side up. In sauce pan, bring marinade to boil to create a sauce. Reduce heat and simmer Meanwhile, in sauce pan, add 2½ cups of rice and 5 cups of water. Bring to boil, stir once, cover and cook on low heat for 20-25 min. Fluff with fork Place chicken over rice. Drizzle with sauce and garnish with a few extra raspberries

Volunteer Fire Continued...

Educating students and the public are also important. Members of the department have done presentations at the school and been at Ag day. They show the equipment and how to use it, explain what they do and encourage anyone who is interested to check into being a firefighter.

A lot of our firefighters are getting older and there aren't many of the younger generation that are interested. As more young people leave to find jobs in other areas, the older ones are left to try and continue. Glen Gillett and Leonard Eickhoff worked together to get grants to update the fire trucks and equipment. All the firefighters have pagers now and there are better radios for communications (most times). As long as we live in rural

Montana with lots of rugged area for lightning strikes, unattended campfires, burning ditches, hot bearings on farm and ranch equipment, there will always be a need for a fire department and the men and women willing to leave their own jobs and work to give of their time to be there.

Thunderstorms with lots of dry lightning strikes always cause worry that a fire will smolder for a few days in trees, then blow up into a big fire. Sometimes the department gets requests for help from other counties in a mutual aid agreement, and we have men, women, trucks and equipment that travel to where they are needed. The current members of the fire department are Tye Lund, chief, Ray Rowton, assistant chief, Glen Gillett, fire warden and training

officer, Kardy Eickhoff, secretary, Leonard Eickhoff, Kody Lund, Ray Hale, Orren and Laura Kiehl, Joel Odermann, Craig Iverson, Gage Iverson, Kelby Sandman, Levi Nowlin, Carl Kimmel, Andy Kimmel, Wyndon Kimmel, Greg Carter, Shelby Murnion, Gary Fitzgerald, Toston Browning, Ben Zimmerman, Nash Zimmerman, Craig Torgerson, and Jake Kramlich. Dave Grantier had been on the fire department and retired last year after 29 years. They couldn't talk him into staying one more year to get his 30 years but thank you Dave for 29 years of service. If you see any of these men or women around, be sure and tell them thank you for being willing to give of their time to be a member of the Winnett Volunteer Fire Department.

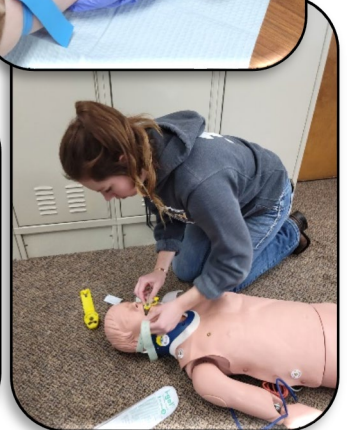
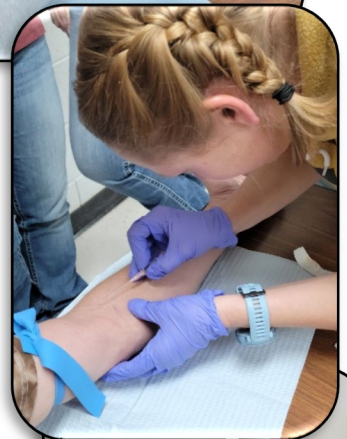
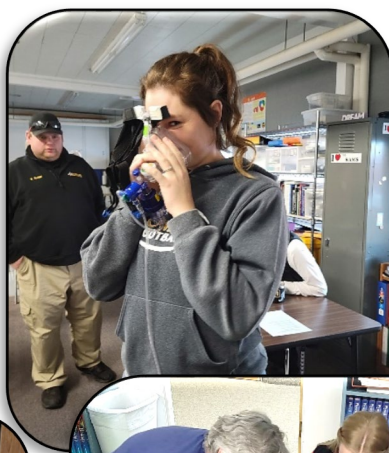

Request for Interest for a Planned Rural Montana Meat Processing Facility

We are looking for someone who is skilled in meat processing and business management and is interested in an opportunity to start and grow a small-scale meat processing facility in Winnett, Montana. The specific structure is flexible to provide opportunity for the right person (or people) and benefit all who are involved in this future rural community-based business venture.

Petroleum County is located in Central Montana with the only town of Winnett being its county seat. It is sparsely populated with about 500 residents, and has large numbers of cattle and wildlife, making it a producer of agriculture products and a destination for wildlife hunting.

There is documented interest and demand from area ranchers and residents for a meat processing facility started in the area that would provide:

- Processing of livestock for producers and residents to support the local food system by making local meat available to the area.
- A processing outlet for local livestock feedlots.
- Seasonal processing of regionally harvested wild game.

The local committee who has been working on this idea, offers the following:

- A small acreage 2 miles from Winnett located on Highway 200 East, that includes about 35 acres, 1200 sq. ft. home, 30x60 pole barn, private well, and good access. The owner of this property has a willingness to work with someone with the described qualities to provide housing and build-out a small-scale meat processing facility onsite.
- A proposed small feedlot facility across the road from this property, offering a steady supply of cattle for processing.
- Survey documentation of local residents, which quantifies interest in use of a facility by producers bringing both cattle and wild game, and local buy-in for meat products.
- A progressive, supportive community who would embrace a committed business.
- Great school, daycare facility, high-speed internet service, and basic rural amenities in Winnett.
- Possible grant opportunities for facility infrastructure.

What would be needed from an interested party:

- Willingness to produce a business plan, knowledge of the meat processing business structure and permitting needs, good communication skills to work with agencies, producers, and customers.
- Ability to provide "skin in the game" which could include capital, labor, equipment, and/or management, and a willingness to discuss any and all options.
- A hardworking, committed family or sole operative who is self-motivated to own and operate the facility and do what it takes to be successful.
- Commitment to rural community success, sustainability, and local values.
