#### "Petroleum County Community Center: A Place to Gather" Written by Lance Olson, PCCC Director

Petroleum The County Community Center (PCCC) started out with an ambitious group of locals in 2017 who wanted a place to gather. Originally, it started out meeting at an individual's house talking about the vision and plans for such a building. The committee would meet to discuss how big it would be, what would be included for use and what type of events they 🔆 had envisioned to use the During this time, building. PCCC established an account with the Petroleum County Endowment under the Central Montana Foundation umbrella, where donors could give tax deductible donations. While they began raising money for the center, the community was then surveyed for what they wanted in the center, land

parcels were donated and purchased for the building site, and PCCC received a planning grant for preliminary architectural work where they then hired Slate Architecture. In the summer of 2019, many Winnett alumni in the area were able to stop by the PCCC construction site where we shared our dream at an informational table. One in particular stepped up and wanted to make this dream into a reality. Larry Carrell (class of 1958) and the PCCC's main donor, saw this vision and decided to help this group create what we see today.

Larry, and his wife Kathi, pledged \$4.5 million to the project with a dollar-for-dollar match of \$500,000. This total would provide the funds for...

# COMMUNITY SPOTLIGHT: Hugh Brindley


Fiery! That word popped out of Mary Brindley's mouth immediately when I asked what Hugh was like as a young man. When we both laughed, she said, "You were at our house enough to know what I mean." I did know what she meant. I spent many hours at the Brindley house with their daughter Sonia, my best friend all the way through school. In my household, voices were rarely raised. The Brindley household was - how should I sav this - more animated. Hugh met his match in Mary, who though much quieter, could stand her ground when needed. Both his daughters, Patricia and Sonia, could be peppery at times, too. Usually, Matt and I blended into the background, quietly reading our books until the dust settled.

The Brindley-Shaw friendship started before my time. As a young man recently out of the Marines, Hugh deer with my dad, Lee Shaw. When Mary and Hugh married in 1956, they set up their 8 x 29 foot trailer in my parents' yard at Mosby. Mary said she can't exactly remember when she met Hugh, but she certainly knew who he was before they started dating.

Back to that fiery temperament. Some of the small local communities like Cat Creek, Mosby, Flatwillow and

Valentine used to gather on Sunday afternoons for a competitive session of softball. Mary recalled seeing Hugh, in a moment of disgust at a play in the game, whip off his hat, throw it on the ground, and stomp on it. "Oh, I knew who he was," she nodded. She confessed, "He was the handsomest thing I had ever seen." Their actual spent time playing chess and hunting courtship was quite short. Hugh wrote ditches and dams. to Mary when she went to Bozeman to college in January 1956, and they married in September of that same year. They'll celebrate their 67th wedding anniversary this year.

> Hugh came to Petroleum County in 1943 after graduating from school in Oelrichs, SD. His parents William S. and Margaret Brindley bought the O'Dea ranch southeast of Cat Creek in 1941. Hugh joined the Marines in February 1944, made it through boot camp at San Diego, and then finished a course in radar technology at George Washington University. Posted to Hawaii, he served on battleships with the 4th Marine Division in the Marshall and Japanese islands and was present in the area when the flag was raised at Iwo Jima on February 23, 1945. He mustered out July 9, 1946, receiving the princely sum of \$100 as final payment for services rendered.

Hugh went on to play football and baseball for one season at the University of Wyoming and then returned to Winnett and worked in the earth moving business. Marv wasn't sure where he learned his trade, but I found a clue in his discharge papers which stated he was a farm hand who herded cattle and made irrigation

Most of Hugh's entry in The Pages of Time is a matter-of-fact account of the way he built up his business, keeping pace with new technological developments in machinery. He employed a number of local men -Tom Barnett, Keith Braaten, Jim Hill, Brett Shaw, Warren Damschen, Walt Manual, Butch Arthur, and Bill Meserve to name just a few.

I asked Butch Arthur what it was like to work for Hugh. "He really cared about his employees," Butch said and added how appreciative he was of all the business Hugh brought to him later when he purchased the Hilltop garage. Mary and Hugh lived in their camper on the out-of-town jobs, and they often toured their home-awayfrom home on Sunday afternoons. Sonia wasn't convinced this lifestyle would suit her. In our class will, she gifted her "cooking ability to anyone who wants to live in the boonies all summer in a camper and cook for my Dad."

When Hugh wasn't moving earth, he served in various roles in the Winnett community, including stints on the Winnett Town Council, as Mayor, and on the school board. Hugh was active politically, too, and served as a delegate to the Democratic convention. Hugh wasn't all business and duty, though. In his down time he liked to fish, fly, travel, bowl, and dance. He was a core member of the Shobe Herd square dancing group in the 70s.

Mary and Hugh became world-wide travelers in 1980 when they went on a three week tour of Australia and New Zealand on a trip sponsored by the National Contractors Association.

Hugh loved Australia so much that he told Mary, "If I ever come back here, you'll never get me to come back home." The laid-back lifestyle, lush scenery, and plentiful fish at Lake Rotorua, New Zealand, were also areat attractions. Marv recalled begging some potatoes from a local restaurant to pair with the fish they caught. A meal never was so tasty! Their next trip to Japan was 🛠 interesting, but a bit wintry, and just didn't measure up to paradise. In July 1999 Hugh and Mary drove up to Alaska where they parked their van on the beach at Anchor Point and went deep sea fishing with Jim and Sharon Tate, former neighbors. They then traveled on to Anchorage to visit Ted Barnett, who stayed with them occasionally during high school.

Hugh's proudest accomplishment is his family. All three children graduated from college and went on to present him with 13 grandchildren. An avid supporter of sports, he followed the exploits of his children, grandchildren and great grandchildren (he now has 14) for over forty years. He especially loved girls' sports as Patricia and Sonia helped launch the winning Ramettes basketball team during the 70s. He was equally proud of Matt, who competed in basketball, football, and track.

Hugh and Mary moved to Laurel last year to be nearer to family. At age 97, Hugh has slowed down quite a bit, but his fiery spirit still gleams in his eyes.

# WINNETT SCHOOL NEWS

### SUPERINTENDENT'S CORNER

Because of the time frame in which the Winnett Times is put together, it's the beginning of March as I write this (and snowing!), but I'm staring squarely into the face of the end of the school year. I cannot believe how unbelievably fast this school year has gone by. And though grateful for several inches of much-needed snow, we'll be looking at spring performances, graduation and warm, sunny days before we know it.

One of our major projects this year has been to address facilities upgrades here at school. The goal is always to make fiscally responsible decisions and to make the most of what we have. We're looking at sealing up air leaks in our 'Old' building this summer, along with new insulation and siding, so that what we put into the building in terms of heat is retained. Also, though, it's no surprise to many that we are maintaining an aging coal-powered boiler system. We've taken a number of steps to pursue federal grants to upgrade that system, and we need your help.

Many of you who receive the WT also received an income survey in the mail from Winnett School as it went out to all voters in Petroleum County. The survey is needed to determine our eligibility for a Community Block Development Grant (CDBG), which could potentially cover \$600,000 or more than 80% of a boiler upgrade/conversion to propane. Our minimum return rate for that survey is 67% - which means we must have that many returned in order to have a chance at qualifying for that grant. The survey is a bit confusing in how it asks about household income - for some it seems that there is no correct box to mark. If you don't find a box that is accurate for your income, you simply mark the number of members in your household and sign and return it. We provided stamped, addressed envelopes for your convenience. If you're unsure at all as to how to complete the survey, please give us a call and we will be happy to help. We're hoping to have all the surveys back no later than April 30. Thanks so much in advance for your help!

On another note, here are a couple of key dates for the spring: Spring Concert, May 16th at 2 pm; Graduation, May 21st at 1 pm, and the Awards Banquet, May 22nd at 6:30 pm.

Finally, we're pleased to announce that Teri Harris has been hired as the superintendent for the 23-24 school year. Her wealth of experience in education and school administration will be an asset to the school and community. *Lindsey Wilkerson*

building the community center including a permanent endowment to maintain the building for years to come. The PCCC had also obtained a 501(c)(3) status. It doesn't end there – The Bruno & Evelyne Hill Betti Foundation (which began funding the Betti Foundation Youth Program in 2021) contributed another \$1.41 million towards an endowment for the community center.

With these generous donations, among others throughout the planning process, locals came together to start planning and form committees. They met twice per month to discuss the best building design and amenities for this community and beyond. The Board, made up of Sue McKenna, Luann Knutson, Gari King, Brandi Lang and Brenda Brady worked hard with Slate to provide the best place for people to gather. Over years of discussion, every detail from the

the lights, windows, kitchen, a rotating display of local art and heritage, donor appreciation, flooring, furniture, etc. became key elements to create this space. As discussions went on, more ideas for use of this largespace grew; more opportunities, more events, more use in general. In the summer of 2021,. the PCCC hired Director, Lance Olson, to help with planning, promoting and get familiarized with the whole process. Lance will be greeting visitors, assisting users and making sure the building runs smoothly for all who visit. With construction coming to a close, the PCCC has provided part time jobs for locals and a valuable economic impact to the community of Winnett. We believe this trend will continue for many years to come.

The PCCC has already held a number of events, even with construction putting the finishing touches to the building. The soft opening was the "Clueless production of in Catscratch," a play written by Terry Lewis with a cast of Winnett's very own. The first night of the play had an outstanding ut for a spaghetti dinner, put on by P.I.E., and attendees witnessed the murder mystery. People came from far and wide to take a tour of the building before the dinner and play began. It was the perfect way to introduce our building with the production put on by the PCCC Players and for the public to see what can be offered at this building. Since then, the PCCC has begun holding events such as Crafting With Neighbors every third Wednesday, elementary and junior high basketball practice, ACES events, Bruno & Evelyne Hill Betti Youth Program, and small meetings all while construction is still going on.

There are three meeting venues in the building, all named after our main benefactor's family: The Rebecca Room can seat up to 45 people for smaller gatherings, includes a TV for virtual meetings, and a sink/counter. The Wesley Room can seat 75-100 people with a large TV for virtual meetings; a sound system that includes a microphone, speakers throughout, and Bluetooth capabilities; and an exit to an...

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outdoor patio. The Wesley Room is also the home of the Senior Citizen group, and eventually there will be historical displays of Cat Creek and the town of Winnett. Lastly, Carrell Hall can seat up to 300 people: includes a stage with lighting; a sound system with microphone, speakers throughout, and Bluetooth capabilities; basketball and volleyball court; and exits to an outdoor patio. A commercial sized kitchen is available for rental use as well; with a stand up convection oven; an electric oven and stove top; a gas oven and stove stop; large fridge and freezer space; a commercial dishwasher; and plenty of counter space. The Senior Citizens have a fridge, freezer and pantry space for their weekly gatherings. There are also two rental offices available for use under rental contract. These are great places for private business work or personal meetings. A bathroom and shower are also included in this portion of the building. While our website is constantly being updated, please visit pcccwinnett.org for more information. 
