They keep horses and tried raising chickens, but raccoon invasions put an end to that. The family enjoys traveling and took an extended road trip to Florida, stopping to visit family.



Haley Kiehl is another familiar face around the school. She's back as a "floating teacher", meaning she spends her half days teaching 6<sup>th</sup> grade math and doing interventions to help elementary students over academic bumps.

# Rango's bast Ride - by Shaylie Ahlgren (8th Grade)



This was the day, and it was going to be sorrowful. I woke up at six this morning, before anyone else, and left a note on the whiteboard for Dad. I told him what the plan was and when to meet me at Black Horse Gate. When I went outside the air was crisp, and the dew was settled in little droplets in the grass. I headed off the hill and went into the barn to grab a bridle. I grabbed the navajo beaded one off of Rango's hook on the front of my saddle rack. I went out into the lot on the sidehill where the horses were and slowly walked up to Rango, scratched his forehead between his ears, and threw a rein around his neck. He was old and very well broke, so he stood still and took the bit right away. I led him over to the fence, climbed almost all the way up, and hopped on.

I was riding bareback today. We headed out the end of the lane and went by the haystack. I called my tri-colored border collie, Emma, and she came happily running down the hill. As we headed out down the creek with the tall, lush grass growing alongside it, a lot was going through my mind.

I was glad that I got to be the last one to ride him, doing so was an honor. We were going down the trail that Rango and Molly, my great Aunt, had gone on every day to check the sheep. We also went on it every day during calving season to check cows. The ruts were about a foot deep into the ground, because the soil had been worn away with each time that we had gone on the trail. All three of us, Rango, Emma, and I had memorized that ole' trail like the back of our hand. Today was going to be a very sad day and I knew it. The grass was swaying with the warm, end-of-summer breeze. The leaves had all turned to a pretty orange or yellow, and the days were getting shorter. There was a green tint shining through the old grass across the place from the rain that we got last week. The hayfields were bright green, and freckled with antelope. It was sixty-five degrees and there was a small storm brewing in the west. It was the perfect day for a ride.

We turned off the creek, and up this big, wide coulee, and there were deer speckled throughout the rolling draws draining down into the coulee. As we walked through the hayfields, and started up the hill, I let Rango eat. I was definitely starting to get sad, and I knew that I was going to miss him. We took our time, and I got off and led him up the hill, side by side, Emma, Rango and I, just how it should be. As we got the top of the big hill, at the end of the trail, I whispered quietly in his ear, "It has been a great opportunity to get to know you and to have the chance to make all of these memories with you buddy, and I am sorry that it has to end like this. You taught me everything, and I will never forget you. I love you so much buddy, goodbye, or at least until we ride again. If I could have it any other way I would." She knew that we had never left Rango at the end of the trail, and she had never seen me that sad. She could tell that something was wrong, and you could see the sadness in her little hitched walk. At least I still had her.

When we were about three-quarters of the way home, the sky started raining. It was a cool, refreshing rain, and I was not going to complain about it. About five minutes later, when the rain had passed and there were puddles on the ground, and a rainbow in the sky, I saw something. Right above the rainbow there was a big, fluffy cloud in the shape of a horse. There was a bright, white cloud where a horse's blaze should be, and it was in the shape of a heart, just like Rango's. I knew Emma saw it, too.

# LEFTOVER TURKEY SOUP

2 or 3 c Potatoes, cut 2 or 3 c Carrots, cut

1 c Celery, chopped 1 Onion, chopped

1 can Corn (optional)

⅓ c Flour 1/4 c Butter 2 c Milk 2 c Shredded Cheese Leftover Turkey, diced

Salt & Pepper (to taste)

Add potatoes, carrots, onion, celery, water, salt and pepper to a large pot and sauté. In a separate pan put the flour, butter, milk and cheese. Simmer and cook until cheese is melted. Add this to the soup, along with the leftover turkey.
