### "Amanda Olive Swift: Winnett's Textbook-Packin' Heroine"

Amanda Swift was born in 1870 in Maine where she grew up and attended college. She arrived in Montana, education in her pocket and determination in her fiber. She and her brother Walter settled in Winnett about 1911, taking up homestead claims around three miles north of town. In the fall of 1913, she applied for the elementary teaching position in Winnett's District #26. At 43, Amanda was no doubt considered a spinster. Though hired to elementary grades, she also packed credentials to teach high school. She was hired for an eight-month term but was also required to work with outlying students during summer months.

Before long, Amanda saw there was also the need to polish the education of older students. She gathered a group of high school-aged youngsters and tutored them after school and on Saturdays. In addition, in 1914 she ran for Fergus County Superintendent of Schools. She was defeated, but Swift was not deterred. At that time, Winnett was part of vast Fergus County. There were only three secondary schools in that county: Lewistown, Moore, and Hobson. Amanda plotted to make Winnett the fourth, come hell or high water. Turns out, that's just what she

Miss Swift owned a saddle horse, and she rode the shoes off Brownie. By 1916, she was on a mission to visit every household and document each potential student.

One day while scouting, she encountered riders. She inquired about yonder dwelling. The men advised her that a passel of kids lived there, belonging to a father set against education. Even determined, Amanda rousted out a tall man who seemed to be foaming at the mouth - a startling sight. She asked the lathered man about his children. He vehemently denied having any. When she insisted, he moved closer, wielding a straight-edge razor. The teacher on horseback retreated, belatedly recognizing she'd been "jobbed" by the not-so-helpful travelers.

Amanda rounded up her documentation and made copies of school records. As requested, she sent them to the Fergus County Superintendent of Schools who would examine the papers and forward them to Helena. The wheels were in motion. But no word came from the capital. Amanda grew impatient. In mid-summer. the State School Board scheduled a conference. Amanda was determined to attend. She boarded the stage connecting with the Grass Range train.

Unfortunately, that June two feet of snow had blanketed central Montana, Snowmelt forced creeks out of their banks, wreaking havoc with transportation. The stage driver filled her in on the flooding and impassible roads which left stage and automobile travel out of the question. But it might be possible on horseback if she stuck to hillsides.

The stage backtracked to Teigen, where Amanda spent the night, saddling up early. Things went fine until she reached a crossing that resembled a lake. A local man encouraged, "Go right ahead. 'Tisn't deep. I brought my horse through it last night." Amanda gulped and plunged in. Unfortunately, the water had risen Soon her horse overnight. swimming, its rider frantically clinging to the saddle horn. Both emerged dripping and bedraggled. Amanda made Grass Range in time to catch the early train for Helena, patching her appearance up in Lewistown. The floods covered portions of the track, requiring delays and transfers. At one spot, the passengers had to hike over a mile to the next viable section.

Amanda arrived at the Capitol a tad late. At the meeting room's entrance, she heard the representative from Hobson speaking. He scoffed at the idea that a thinly-populated outpost had the audacity to form a high school. He declared it just wishful thinking on the part of "some damn Yankee from New England" trying to create a job for herself. Moore's delegate chimed in, maintaining that the outpost in the woods (what woods?) would siphon funds from Fergus's three fine existing high schools. The State Superintendent was a politician; she obligingly agreed with their assessment. However, her deputy, Leon Foote, ...

# Community Spotlight: Winnett Cire

The precursor to Winnett Tire started with Harold Belstad as he moved his family from North Dakota before the big snowstorm of 1955. Harold had a partnership with Lloyd Berg in Winnett Motors and the Ford dealership for the region. Harold then operated Cliff's Auto Service until 1967, when he opened Harold's Auto Service in the former Ford Service Building. In 1971, Harold and his family built a new building on lots Broadway where Garage. Dunlap's, and Cliff's Auto Service had been at what is now 115 N. Broadway. After 16 years, the garage was sold to Bud and Donna Rabern in 1987. (Pages of Time)

Bud and Donna Rabern worked and leased various local ranches before moving to Winnett in 1976. In 1978, they purchased the Continental Oil bulk plant and nine years later, Harold's Auto Service. (Pages of Time)

# The following narrative is by Brad Rowton.

"I walked through the door in March 1992 at the Rabern Oil Co., owned by Bud and Donna Rabern. I was hired to drive a bulk truck delivering gas and diesel to farmers and ranchers. Bud knew I was a farm boy mechanic, so I twisted wrenches more than I delivered fuel. We sold and repaired tires plus filling propane bottles.

In January 1999, the shop changed ownership. Owners of GS Oil in Roy, Montana, Gary and Jolene Smith purchased the business and changed the name to Winnett Tire. That's when the tire business took off. I was still twisting wrenches but doing a lot more tires. In later years, the vehicles got too advanced with computer and electrical and I quit doing mechanics.

In October of 1999, Gary and Jolene had put in new gas and diesel pumps so we were back to dispensing fuel. Now I was Manager and Operator with the help of my wife, Deb running the front part in the afternoon so I could stay in the shop instead of running back and forth. Our 3 boys, Neil, Ray, and Bryce learned how to do tires also and were good help. Now they have jobs of their own, so I am pretty much on my own.

As the tire business grew, so did

the tires. The car and pickup tires got larger and there were more semi and tractor tires, but with the help of some special tools, new tire machines, balancers, and techniques, I have learned how to do them. There are still some I cannot do by myself, but I do what I can to help people get down the road and back in the field.

I know this is short but if I could write stories, I probably would not be busting tires for a living!"



begged to differ. Lewistown's Principal Cummings backed Foote and supported Winnett, though he did think it wise to defer accreditation. He expressed resentment at the man from Hobson's statement that the teacher was only jobseeking. Cummings declared he would welcome Miss Swift to his staff any time.

Amanda, shocked and furious, boiled in to take command, fanning her paperwork out and presenting her argument. She confronted the representatives Fergus County. She declared she'd found from the Fergus County Superintendent that they had asked to examine the documents Amanda gave her. They assured the superintendent they would forward them to Helena. That apparently hadn't happened. Cummings quickly withdrew his motion to defer and moved for immediate accreditation. The motion passed unanimously, and Winnett received its apportionment of \$5000. The trip-worn but triumphant Miss Swift returned home a heroine.

In 1916 Jeanette Rankin was running for Montana's seat in the U.S. House of Representatives. Once again, Miss Swift rolled up her sleeves, riding that horse from ranch to farm to campaign for Rankin. A tea was being hosted for Jeanette in Lewistown. Amanda attempted to rally a party of supporters and one of Winnett's few automobiles to make the trip. Failing that, she disgustedly saddled up at 3:00am and struck out for Lewistown. She made it to the 4pm tea. A group of Democrats from Grass Range decided to go hear the candidate, figuring that if a horseback-riding teacher was that enthused, they'd give Rankin a look. They ultimately voted for her, too! Montana's Jeanette Rankin became the first woman to serve in Congress.

In the fall of 1917, Miss Swift was hired to teach grades 7-12. She secured Mrs. Brown from Flatwillow Creek to serve as guardian for the out-of-town students batching in Winnett. It was a good arrangement until Mrs. Brown came to Amanda with a problem. The shiftless fellow tending Brown's milk cow and calf had fizzled. If she couldn't find his replacement, she'd have to quit. Amanda bullied her reluctant brother into looking after the cows but had no luck finding anyone to bring them to Winnett. So, early one Sunday morning, she saddled Brownie and struck out for Brown's. She located the cow and what turned out to be a yearling calf, managed to rope the cow, and had quite a rodeo dragging the pair to join her brother's dairy herd.

Once, due to rain, Walter Swift gave his two hired men the weekend off. Unfortunately, Walter became quite ill and needed the doctor in Lewistown That left 15 cows requiring attention. Amanda recruited Walter's girl housekeeper with milking skills.

That Sunday the women milked those cows and loaded up a saddle horse, the buggy, and a trailer to get the milk delivered.

Monday rolled around and still no hired men. Amanda resignedly rose at 3am, donned her brother's overalls, rounded up cows, milked them, separated off the cream, prepared for school, and drove seven miles with her cargo. In town, she found a boy to help deliver the milk and still managed to arrive at school ten minutes early. Those spare minutes were spent dispatching a large rattlesnake, one of seven killed nearby that summer.

In 1918, Amanda again ran for Fergus County Superintendent. This time she won. Added to her teaching duties, she was

responsible for the rural schools. She rode that horse to supervise her teachers. though eventually she bought a Dodge touring car. Still, she never failed to throw her saddle in the back. Neither rain, snow, or breakdowns were going to keep her from visiting her schools. She could always borrow a horse, after all. She served a second term in 1920, and in 1924 was elected as Petroleum County's first Public Superintendent of Schools, honoring her hard work in establishing rural schools. She served two terms. It is suspected that Amanda was one of the characters in the following anecdote:

It seems a teacher from the north country begged the visiting county superintendent for a ride to Winnett. She hastily packed, applied rogue to her cheeks and jumped aboard. The supervisor took a startled look at her passenger and stopped at Box Elder Creek. Apparently, the "dab" of blush had the earmarks of war paint. She advised the flashy teacher to scrub her face before they continued on to meet the rather straightlaced Winnett faculty.

Some of the wonderful stories about Amanda Swift are from her own article entitled "Origin and Progress of the Schools in Winnett". Once again, The Pages of Time was the source for this article. If you open to one of the first pages of this rich font of information, you will see the tribute to Amanda Swift. Petroleum County owes this determined teacher so much. Her accomplishments overflow into the history of the county's schools as well as its citizens' biographies. Amanda passed away in 1963, but her service, dedication and rosy cheeks will live on, come hell or high water, within The Pages of Time.

# GRANNY'S CHERRY CHEESECAKE

Leslie Iverson Winnett, MT

#### Crust

2 whole pkgs. Graham crackers, crushed

1 stick margarine granulated sugar to taste

Add all ingredients together, stir until moist. Press to bottom and as far as possible up the sides of a 9 X 13" cake pan. Bake at 375° for 10 minutes.

#### Cheesecake


3 T. flour

4 pkgs. cream cheese ½ tsp. vanilla 1½ cup sugar

1/4 tsp. salt 5 eggs + 2 yolks

1/4 cup heavy whipping cream 2 (20-oz cans) cherry pie filling

Preheat oven to 400°. Beat cream cheese until fluffy. Add vanilla. Blend in sugar, flour, and salt, mix well. Add eggs and yolks one at a time until blended. Add heavy whipping cream, blend. Pour cream cheese mixture on crust and bake for 8-10 minutes. Reduce heat to 200° and continue baking for 1½ hours. Turn off heat with door ajar and let stand in oven for 30 minutes. When cool spread cherries on top and refrigerate.
