"Abundant Generosity: The Carrell Donor Advised Fund Grants"

When I was in college, I had a professor who regularly reminded us that organizations - schools, musical ensembles, athletic teams, churches, professional organizations, service groups, places of employment - were only as good as the people in them, and what they chose to contribute to them. Or rather, that actions demonstrate what is important to us. I think you can easily say that based on what we see around us, Winnett is packed with people who contribute much and demonstrate that whose actions Winnett matters to them.

This is one of the things that has always amazed me about Winnett: the sheer number of things that are accomplished here by such a small population. There is evidence everywhere of people who love their community and pour their time, talents, and resources into it. This takes many different forms, formal and informal, as official or unofficial community projects. Often, it's just simply that people are looking out and caring for those around them.

Larry Carrell is also a person that believes that actions and contributions matter. When I called to interview him for this article, I was looking for a quote or a life philosophy that I could write about as the basis for his continued generosity. He said that he gets that question a lot. (You can imagine that he does a lot of interviews.) In the end

he said, "I guess I say it a lot, but let your actions define you, or rather your actions will define you." He said that he's been fortunate in life, through "some luck and a lot of hard work", to have made a living that was far beyond what his needs were. He was pleased then, to create or donate to different projects in a way that would "benefit younger people, to better themselves if they work hard."

Carrell's actions have certainly demonstrated that creating opportunities for others is important to him. While most people are probably familiar with his donation that made possible the soon-to-be completed Petroleum County Community Center. he's now established the Lawrence and Kathleen Carrell Donor Advised Fund (DAF). It is another profound act of generosity that will have immeasurable impacts on our community.

The Carrell Donor Advised Fund & Purpose

The Lawrence and Kathleen Carrell Donor Advised Fund (DAF) will act as a granting program to fund community projects and provide scholarships in Winnett and Petroleum County. The DAF is administered by the Central Montana Foundation and the main goals of the DAF are to "provide financial assistance for the Petroleum County community to sustain their way of life without increasing tax burdens

and to assist young individuals with achieving their career path goals." (Carrell Grant Application, 2022) Basically, the Carrells created an additional fund dedicated to all kinds of community development and enhancement projects, separate from the Community Center funds. Within this fund is an annual allocation (a percentage of the total available DAF) dedicated to funding scholarships.

The DAF Committee & Administration

The DAF committee was created so that grants would be chosen and administered locally, or as Mr. Carrell put it, "You're the ones who are here and know what you need". The committee will always consist of, at a minimum, a member (or members) or representative of each of the following Petroleum groups: County Commissioners (1), Winnett Town Council (1), Winnett School Board (1), Petroleum County Endowment (1), and Winnett ACES (2). The rationale for organizing the committee in such a way was that the major non-profit entities within the community (all grant eligible) would all be represented. The committee will decide by consensus which projects to approve.

In the spring of 2022, the groups listed above were asked to appoint representatives for the committee's...

Community Spotlight: *<i>Cillian Moore*

Lillian Moore has lived a long and busy life, but even with many years spent raising children, working in the restaurant business, and helping out on her family ranch, one thing has remained constant...her love of baseball. That fondness began during her elementary years at Dovetail School where she exceled at playing "work up" baseball during recess. Her enjoyment of the game has continued throughout her life. At age 93, Lillian says she still likes watching a good game of baseball.

Lillian's mother, Borghild Lunde, came to the US from Norway, and her father, Dudley Whisonant, was raised in North Carolina. The two met and married in the Midwest and moved their young family to the isolated area north of Winnett. At that point, Lillian was two years old and her brother Donald just fifteen months younger. Little brother Joseph joined the family when his big sister Lillian was 9.

Like all children of the Great Depression, Lillian faced some tough times. She recalls her parents leaving her and Donald with friends while they

went away for a couple of days. She says they both got so homesick, they cried. It was terrible! They were so glad to see their parents again. But the hardest time for her did not come about because of homesickness, drought or grasshoppers. When she was 15, her dear brother Don was killed in a horse accident. It was a very sad time indeed.

In June of 1946, Lillian was married to Arthur Moore in Jordan. She says most people called her new husband Art, but she always preferred Arthur. The two became acquainted when Lillian was a teenager and she took a job caring for Arthur's two young half-siblings, Perry and Bernice Wiggins. She worked for Arthur's mother cooking, keeping house, gardening, and baby-sitting. She was even put to work in the fields shocking corn.

The family lived and worked on several ranches and Dudley also took jobs in the oil field and on construction crews. When Lillian was about 8 years old, they moved to a place near Dovetail so she could attend school there. She may have gotten a bit of a late start on her education, but she says with a grin, "I was all caught up by about 3rd grade."

Lillian remembers her dad helping to build a new outhouse for the school while he was with the WPA. She recalls Dovetail neighbors her fondly. especially Tom and Anna (Annette) Iverson and their family. They used to "neighbor back and forth" and whenever Lillian went to their house, Anna always had cookies for her.

As an upper elementary student, Lillian moved with her family to the Petrolia Lake area where she attended the Solf School. She finished 8th grade there and moved on to Winnett High School. Her parents had a house in town during the school year to make attending easier. When thinking back over her school experiences, Lillian remembers three favorite teachers: Virginia Carrell, Blanche Saylor and Gladys Sederholm. She said they all knew how to make learning fun.

Arthur worked as a mechanic in a couple of garages in Winnett. He also worked on some construction jobs, helped on local ranches and often fixed cars for friends around town. In 1952, Arthur and Lillian bought a place on

Flatwillow Creek from Clinton Hassett. They had cattle, sheep and hogs and also raised crops. Five children grew up there, as well: Linda, Lorraine, Judy, LeRoy and Steve.

As a young adult, Lillian got the first of many jobs she would hold in a restaurant. She first worked at Mother Stewart's Café, which stood where the new community center will soon be completed. She then moved on to the Stockman Café where she worked as a cook and waitress. After a few years, she leased the business and ran it on her own. She had a small house in Winnett where she could stay in case of bad weather, but she also kept up with work on the ranch.

In 1980 Lillian and Arthur bought their own establishment, the Winnett Bar, which they operated together for 26 years. When asked which item on her menu customers liked best, Lillian said, "I sure did cook a lot of hamburgers. Well, all kinds of beef really, but especially burgers. People seemed to like my homemade pies, too." Even though she admits running a restaurant calls for long hours and a lot of hard work, Lillian says she really liked it. "I enjoyed all the people that came in."

When thinking about the differences between her life back then and the way she lives now, her first thoughts go to technology and modern conveniences. She remembers moving into the house on Flatwillow when it had no electricity,

water or telephone. There was a light plant in Winnett at that time, but its services did not extend to ranchers out of town. In the same way, Montana Power was not interested in providing electricity for rural areas of the state.

Lillian remembers making many trips to a well on top of a nearby hill to fill a big tank with water for the house. The water was pumped by a gas-powered engine, which she says was always out of gas. When Fergus Electric Co-op arrived in the area with power for the ranchers, she was ecstatic, "It made a difference," she said. huuuge "Everything was easier after that. We dug our own well and put in an electric pump so we could have all the water we needed. Household chores and ranch

work were simple with electric tools to help." Lillian remains grateful to Fergus Electric to this day.

When it comes to technology, Lillian is up to date. She has a Life Alert system which will enable her to get help in her house if she ever needs it. She also has a TracFone that works wherever she goes, so she feels quite confident about driving herself just about anywhere. She still enjoys visiting with friends and family members, attending Senior Citizens in Winnett and of course, she's happy whenever she can watch a good baseball game.

The Fair was especially remarkable for the Winnett Shamrocks this year. The club won Wednesday's herdsmanship award. Hayley Stahl's last year of 4-H brought her the victory of Grand Champion Market Steer; she also won Grand Champion Senior Cat Showman. Cami and Brody Ahlgren won Herdsmanship for Swine on Thursday. Nash Lund placed 1st in his Dog Education Display about taking care of dogs. Nash also got 1st in Level 1 Wildlife. Bodie Lund got 2nd in his Beef Education Display and he got 1st in his Shooting Sports project. Gracie Gill won Level 4 in Western Horse and topped the market sheep carcass competition. Jasper Tholt won the Dog Rally Novice B and the Dog Agility B and won the overall best in the show. Virgil Tholt not only won Rally Advanced A but succeeded in winning the title of Grand Champion Intermediate Dog Showman. This qualified him to compete in the Small Animal Round Robin, which he also won. Mason Schultz got 1st in his Entomology Project and Sheep Education Display on predicting weights. He got the Wednesday Herdsmanship award for Sheep/Goats. Mason is, once again, Junior Reserve Champion Sheep Showman, his market lamb ranked 8th overall and got 4th in the carcass competition. He also got 1st in Suffolk Ewe 2 and Older, and his ewe lamb received 2nd in the Bred and Owned category. Johnnie Schultz got 1st in his Horse Education Display, placed 3rd in the Working Ranch Horse Level 1 sorting event, plus 5th overall, and 2nd in Intermediate Western Horse Equitation. At the sheep show, he placed 2nd in the Light Weight class with his ewe lamb, 6th and 7th overall with his two market sheep, and got 2nd in the carcass competition. founding meeting in May. In the end, the following individuals were appointed: *Petroleum County Commissioners, Jess Hoge (secretary); Winnett Town Council, Levi Johnson; Winnett School Board, Lindsey Wilkerson (vice-chair); Petroleum County Endowment, Jim Johnke; Winnett ACES, Sig Pugrud (chair) and Katie Lund (treasurer); Special advisors: Skip and Diane Ahlgren, Chris and Gari King, and Laura Nowlin.*

The DAF committee set term limits and rotations for members so that there would be continuity within the committee, especially in the early years. The committee creates guidelines for the grant process, based on the guidelines set forth by Mr. Carrell, and will also review and approve applications.

Grant Eligibility

The Committee encourages all interested parties to contact them about possible projects and eligibility. Eligible projects and applicants are as follows: "Projects that will benefit educational, medical, essential services, civic and cultural projects are eligible and priority is given to projects that will benefit the most residents of Petroleum County and the surrounding area. Grants are limited to tax-exempt organizations (including local governments) or existing projects in Petroleum County that meet not-forprofit status as defined under Section 501(c)(3) of the U.S. Internal Revenue Code, and who are registered and in good standing with the Montana Secretary of State. No match is required, although it makes projects

more competitive. Projects receiving funding must be completed within 18 months of award notification." (Carrell Grant Application, 2022). A list of eligible and ineligible entities is available within the application.

Grant Amounts

There are no specific grant amounts set. Organizations are advised that larger requests could possibly be granted in part, or sometimes over a period of time rather than all at once. The DAF committee is committed to working with and towards worthy projects to the extent possible.



Timeframes and Deadlines

Committee members will be visiting local non-profit groups in September to introduce the DAF grant guidelines, questions, answer and distribute materials. The application will be available at the Winnett ACES website: winnettaces.org or in hard copy at the school office or Clerk and Recorder's office. The first application cycle begins October 1, 2022 with applications due by January 1, 2023. Initially, the committee will have two cycles per year, with deadlines of January 1 and July 1. The application states that applicants will be

notified of a decision within 45 days of applying.

Carrell Scholarship Program

The funding of the scholarship program will be an annual percentage of the total DAF fund. Mr. Carrell's intention is to support and encourage students that may not be the best "traditional" student or the top of their classes academically.

Scholarship applications will be due by March 15th of every year (or the first business day after). In addition to the application usual materials. the application will require two letters of recommendation and also an in-person interview. All kinds of students, without regard to traditional academic success, are encouraged to apply. This includes non-traditional students, like those who may be returning to school after time off for whatever reason, or those who are attending school part-time while supporting themselves and/or a family.

Students who initially are awarded a scholarship will have priority to reapply for subsequent years, provided they can show adequate progress. This will be a shorter application process, but will still include an interview, mostly so that the committee can check in and help celebrate success, as well as gather feedback for the application process going forward.

Scholarship application materials will be available in the Winnett School office, or at the same locations as the other Carrell DAF application materials. Further information on these scholarships will be available in the upcoming months.

LOCAL COOKBOOK RECIPE HIGHLIGHT

BEEF AND BEAN ENCHILADAS

1 lb. ground beef,

- 2 diced green peppers
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 can black beans, drained
- 1 ½ c. shredded pepper jack cheese

2 cans enchilada sauce 16 tortillas

Burt Bevis Winnett, MT

- to continas
- 1 c. mild chunky salsa
- 1 can sliced black olives
- 1 c. chopped onion

Sauté ground beef, green peppers, and onion in small amount of oil. Add salt, beans, ¾ cup shredded cheese and one can enchilada sauce. Fill each of 16 tortillas. Place in greased baking dish. Cover with one can enchilada sauce, salsa, and remaining shredded cheese. Bake 30 minutes at 350°, until heated through. Serve with sour cream and more salsa and shredded lettuce if desired.
